



SUPPLIER ALERT – 2026 FIFA World Cup

United States, Canada and Mexico will co-host the 2026 FIFA World Cup from June 11 to July 19. Due to the scale and geographic spread, increased security complexity and operational disruptions are expected.

Key Risks

- **Demonstrations:** Protests tied to geopolitical issues (e.g., Middle East conflicts, LGBTQ+ rights, anti-government activism) are likely near venues and viewing areas. Most are expected to remain peaceful, though disruptions and isolated incidents may occur.
- **High-risk matches:** Increased protest activity is anticipated around select fixtures, including Iran matches and the final in New Jersey.

Travel & Operations Impacts

- Heightened security measures, road closures, and transit rerouting across all U.S. host cities
- Significant congestion expected in Los Angeles, Atlanta, and other major cities
- Limited vehicle access and increased reliance on public transit in areas such as Seattle
- Increased pressure on transit systems near venues, airports, and downtown cores

Action

- Plan for delays, restricted access, and increased congestion when operating near host cities
- Monitor local government, transit, and emergency management updates
